
9th Annual Alumni-Parents Weekend

Rush Chairman Martin Excels

The members of Kappa Sigma, realizing that the entire future of the fraternity, both near and distant, lies in the pledging of men who have the necessary qualifications to be Lambda Chis, pooled their efforts and produced a pledge class of the highest quality. It must be realized that rushees do not necessarily desire to be members of the best fraternity, but desire to be members which in their minds is best, which is the fraternity with the best rushing program. The quality of rushing put forth by the brotherhood is evidenced by the fact that 55 men attended Lambda Chi preferential evening; these men correspond to 45% of the men of original interest to the fraternity.

Although I.F.C. regulations state that 30 men may be pledged per class, Kappa Sigma pledged only 20 men on the assumption that a small, strong brotherhood is much better than a large, mediocre one. With the realization that mediocrity spells almost certain doom for the fraternity, only men of the highest character were given the opportunity of becoming brothers in the bond of Lambda Chi Alpha. 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High Alpha's Letter

The weeks of the recent past have seen some interesting, perhaps for some, alarming, developments on campus, very directly related to Lambda Chi Alpha. It has been for us a time of decision in part; a time of consideration of values, ideals, and beliefs; a time of introspection in a very real sense. To tell you the story, the founding and traditional principes of Lambda Chi have been the target of strong criticism and even attack. Although the judgment has not come from the university administration, but rather from the student senate, it cannot te ignored. Alfred University has not served an ultimatum, nor even applied severe pressure, but it has made statements in recent years to the effect that it shall expect fraternities to take steps toward elimination of "discriminatory" clauses as soon as possible.

There are two considerations of our "Christian principles" clause. First is the moral issue which calls for a look at beliefs with considerable introspection. Is it morally right to maintain a socially oriented organization of Christian men only? I leave you to make your own decision. Second is probably the more pressing issue at present-shall we call it the "practical" side? Regardless of how you finally answer the last question, you must —we all must realize that the present trend in colleges is away from and in fact, opposite to such clauses. This presents a question which we must answer. Can we exist as such an organization?

This short dissertation brings me to my point. Quite naturally, the weeks of the recent past have also seen Kappa Sigma Zeta of Lambda Chi Alpha draw its bonds closer than perhaps it has been for some time. And perhaps too, this spurs my "renewal campaign"—renewed interest among alumni in the chapter and renewed interest among the chapter members in alumni. This I feel can be done locally by invitations of our faculty members to dinner and to participate in our activities; alumni luncheons and meet-

High Beta's Letter

The newly instituted program which is directed at improving alumni and faculty relations has proven to be quite successful. A member of the faculty, and his family is invited to dinner each week. The faculty has been very cooperative in our new program.

The quiet hours system has also proven to be a successful effort during the first semester of this year. The accumulative index for Lambda Chi for the first half of the school term 61-62 was 1.30, an improvement over recent years.

A certain sense of awareness of the problem of keeping the noise to a minimum from 7:00 P.M. to 11:30 P.M. has developed through mutual participation, from the monitors and members. This system is designed to demonstrate the sense of responsibility necessary for success, from both the brothers and the pledges.

Seven men in the house earned indexes of 2.00 or better, of these, two men exceeded the minimum of 2.30 required for the dean's list. These men were Richard F. Cooley with a 2.32 index and John R. Karlen with a 2.47 index. Although Alfred University has not published the all-men's scholastic average as of the time of this writing, it is expected that the average of the house will be above this figure.

The scholastic average of the men of a fraternity show that these men are learning to balance their activities, both academic and extra-curricular with naturally the greater weight being placed on the academic side. We owe our obligation to Alfred University, for without it there would be no Lambda Chi Alpha. The best way we can live up to this obligation is to meet the University's scholastic standards, to show that fraternities do have a valuable place on the ollege campus.

Report of High Tau

This report will deal mainly with the debt the house incurred last year, and with the measures being taken to alleviate it. The obligations to the Alumni Corporation now stand at \$1,900.00. In order to diminish this debt as quickly as possible, the following measures are in the process of being taken:

1. Legislation was formulated that would insure a full house. It cannot be stressed enough how important this is. This house has, of course, certain fixed costs such as heat, rent, light, and other miscellaneous items. It stands to reason that the fewer the number of occupants there are, the higher the percentage of each individual's house bill there is that will have to be applied against these fixed costs. This means less will be spent for house improvement. This year we have only enough to cover expenses with no surplus to use for house repairs.

2. An increase in room and chapter dues was instituted. Costs, on the average increase 3% a year, while our income has remained relatively fixed for the past three semesters. One can readily see that this situation cannot continue without serious difficulties. The proposal would entail a five dollar increase in room and

chapter dues.

If the above mentioned measures are approved, we will be able to repay the Alumni Corporation in three semesters and still be able to improve and repair our house without assessments or other sacrifices.


Many Members Advance in ROTC

Bob Tweady, Bob Lewkowicz, Larry Bird and Bob Wade were on the varsity X-country team which posted a fine record this fall. Lewkowicz, a junior, was a most consistent runner finishing second man a majority of the time. Tweady is also a junior, Wade a sophomore, and Bird a senior.

Our varsity basketball team had LX's Loren Eaton, a junior, on the first five. Loren, a letterman, was the club's leading rebounder besides being a fine scorer.

John Nolan and Dave Thompson were LX's on the University's ROTC Rifle Team. Both men are veteran senior riflemen and are enjoying a good season.

Alfred University track will have several LX's trying to repeat an undefeated season this year. Bob Wade and Dave Hetherly are up from last year's freshman team. Bob is a distance man, half and mile, while Dave is interested in the shotput, discus, and javelin. Junior Paul Herald will also be throwing the javelin. Loren Eaton and Bob Lewkowicz are two juniors who promise to be big point getters this year. Lewkowicz is a half

miler and miler, while Loren will high jump and broad jump. Steve Crossman, the only senior LX, is the team captain and will again be shooting for an undefeated year in the hurdles.


